Thank you for your generous grant of support of Camp for Children with Rare Genetic Disorders. Thanks to your support, 2021 has been an amazing year of growth and perseverance for Camp Korey and the campers and families we serve.



In 2021, Camp Korey served a total of **1,822 children and family members** including hundreds who returned to on-site programs at Camp Korey after a year of virtual programs. We were able to keep families safe through pre-arrival COVID PCR tests, onsite daily rapid testing, extraordinary sanitation, and masking. To ensure social distancing, most activities were moved outdoors or held in spaces dedicated to individual families during their stay. Each family had their very own cabin and dining tent. "Clean Teams" were put into place and followed families at each activity area to sanitize common areas between uses. We also offered virtual programs for children and families who could not attend camp in person. It was a tremendous effort that resulted in a whole lot of fun and zero families contracting COVID.

Thanks to generous community partners like Tulalip Tribes, Camp Korey continues to offer all camp programs 100% free of charge to families. As seen in the included photos, perhaps more than any other year, campers, siblings, and parents thoroughly enjoyed their experience at Camp Korey. Many families told us that attending Camp Korey was their first major outing since the pandemic began. Thank you for making it possible!

Demographics

- The majority of Camp Korey families are from Washington state (91%), with the remaining 9% of camper families joined us from California, Colorado, Indiana, Missouri, Nebraska, Nevada, Oregon, Texas, and Puerto Rico.
- 42% of our camper families identify as BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, and People of Color)
- 34% of households meet the threshold of low income, with 10% at or below the Federal Poverty Level
- Ages served: 7 and under (8%), 8-12 (48%), 13-15 (18%), 16+ (26%)

Highlights

- 20 children and their family members connected and bonded during Solid Organ Transplant Spring Family Weekend.
- Eight sessions of Family Summer Camp served 202 kids and family members, who enjoyed a safe and socially-distanced week of fun! Activities included archery, adaptive cycling, horseback riding, swimming, arts & crafts, theater, s'mores and singing around the campfire, and lots of laughter with new friends.
- Family Summer Camp also continued programming in partnership with from the Hibulb Cultural Center & Natural History Preserve Center. For seven sessions, volunteers took the stage at Camp Korey's amphitheater to share Tulalip Tribes' culture, history, and traditions with campers, staff, and volunteers. Campers learned about the importance of salmon and crab in the history and culture of the Tulalip Tribes, enjoyed storytelling with "Her First Basket," and received miniature cedar paddles that they could sand and decorate with their families.



- Seven Family Day Adventures enabled 190 campers and family members to enjoy fun-filled events at Woodland Park Zoo, Magnusson Park, Old McDebbie's Farm and Jim's U-Fish, I-Fly Indoor Skydiving, and the Bellingham Bells Baseball Club.
- Camp to You Hospital Outreach delivered more than 575 sanitized activity kits and care packages to
 pediatric patients at Seattle Children's Hospital, Mary Bridge Children's Hospital, Randall Children's
 Hospital, and Ronald McDonald House in Seattle.
- 135 children and family members attended 5 Fall Family Weekends for kids with conditions that include sickle cell disease, inflammatory bowel disease, and skeletal dysplasia.
- 263 families for a fun-filled Fall Harvest Drive-Thru
- Dozens of children, family member, staff, and volunteers shared holiday cheer through our Warm Fuzzy Gift Exchange in December.

<u>Impact</u>

Camp changes lives. In 2021, SeriousFun Children's Network, in partnership with the American Institute for Research (AIR), surveyed more than 2,200 alumni of SeriousFun camps, including Camp Korey. They asked alumni ages 17-30, from eight different counties including the United States, what personal, social, and health-related outcomes were influenced by their experience at a SeriousFun Camp. The most common outcomes that alumni reported as being influenced by their time at camp were:

- Willingness to try new things, 90%
- Appreciation of diversity, 88%
- Self-identity, 86%
- Empathy and compassion, 86%
- Self-confidence, 85%
- Perseverance, 84%
- Friendship skills, 82%
