Number of Children/Families Served: 37

Outcomes: PCHP aims to build parents' skills and confidence as their child's first teacher and strongest education advocate. This outcome is measured by the improvement in PACT (Parent and Child Together) observational assessments with changes in positive parenting behaviors tracked over time. In the report period, PACT assessments improved by 21%, with 58% of parents reaching the "often" goal by the end of the program.

Children showed growth in all pre-literacy skills as well as on Child Behavior Traits (CBT) which include independence, social cooperation, cognitive abilities, emotional stability, and task orientation.

Of the families who participated in the Parent-Child Home Program at Encompass, 83% earned less than \$25,000 a year, 62% of families were English Language Learners, and 84% were people of color. It is also important to note that 55% of the children who participated last year had developmental delays or disabilities.

Stories and Comments:

"My son Matthew just graduated from [Parent-Child Home Program] and I can't believe how amazing it's been and what it's done for him. Thank you from the depths of our hearts for seeding a love of learning in our children's hearts, and giving them tools to explore, learn and grow in ways that I could never have hoped to be able to provide."

Carlos and his mother are both very quiet. They requested a native English-speaking home visitor so that they could be exposed to more English. When the home visitor first began visiting them Ana was not sure how to participate, she would often get up to do a quick task which was very distracting for the child. The home visitor used the child to encourage the mom to participate and before long the mother became much more comfortable having someone in her home. As time goes by Ana is doing more and more of what the home visitor is modeling. She counts, names colors, and narrates what she is doing as she plays or as her child plays. She is asking how to say words in English and she and her child say them together. Despite this progress the home visitor still wasn't sure she was the right fit for the family. We did our mid-year interviews recently and the parent had so many wonderful positive things to say about her home visitor and about the program and the changes she has seen in her son. She said she was quiet at first because she was trying so hard to watch the home visitor and listen to her so that she would be able to do the same things with her son by herself but now she feels like she has the confidence to and knowledge to play with him and teach him while having fun.
