The 2018 FAE Summer Academy at Skagit Valley College provided an enriching and exciting fiveweek summer learning experience for 226 lowincome primarily Latino students. The curriculum focus was literacy integrated within, science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) for students, ages 3-16. In 2018 FAE also integrated art and music to its STEM based program. We had two field trips, one to Bowman Bay near Deception Pass and one to the Skagit County Fair.

Community partnership is highly valued by FAE. We partnered with local school districts – Mt Vernon, Sedro Woolley, Burlington, Stanwood. Two of the districts provided bus transportation to and from the campus and two meals a day. We had 4 school busses and 5 large vans donated by local churches providing transportation each day. We served 7,874 meals. We had 90 volunteers. We hired 14 certified teachers and 12 paid college fellows from the community who are studying to become certified teachers.



Thanks to the support of Tulalip Tribes Charitable Contributions Fund, the Foundation for Academic Endeavors had a very successful year! Our students flourished. There was an attendance rate of 91.5%. Summer learning loss is especially difficult for low-income children. In the 2018 FAE Summer Academy 97% of the children did not have any learning loss. In fact, 56% increased by 1 to 8 grades. Many of the children were sad to be done at the end of the 5 weeks. Many parents are planning to send their children back next summer.



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
