Report

The gracious funding from Tulalip Tribes went towards our Home Repair Service. Our Home Repair Service performs critical home repair, preservation, and weatherization services for low and very low-income homeowners so they can stay secure in their homes. We bring together volunteer builders, businesses who donate building supplies, and funders to cover the majority of project costs for these much-needed repairs with the goal of keeping homeowners in their affordable homes and out of homelessness while also decreasing utility costs and preserving affordable housing in the community.

Our Home Repair Service has completed 25 repair projects and served 58 individuals since the program was launched in 2020. We currently have 17 projects on our waiting list with a 6-9 month wait time for projects to be completed. We have seen a steady increase in need and requests for this service but are severely limited in capacity with only one construction staff managing the project management, donations procurement, volunteer coordination and site supervision of all projects.

Marshall Ramp Project

One in four adults in the United States have some type of disability. Add an aging population to this figure and the importance of accessibility build projects becomes abundantly clear. Disabled adults experience poverty at more than twice the rate of nondisabled adults; nearly half of adults ages 25 to 61 who have lived in poverty for at least one year have a disability. Many disabled homeowners cannot afford to build and repair access points to their home. Our HRS team is committed to stepping up to keep these homes safe and livable.
