This page continues to receive significant traffic, with over 3,300 views to date. Importantly, over 650 local, national, and international community members registered for these free, supportive webinars and many more will access the archived recordings.

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
Hamlin Robinson School has been at the forefront of serving students with dyslexia and other language-based learning differences for almost 40 years. Our purpose is to fill an unaddressed gap in the K-12 education system failing to adequately address the learning needs of up to 20% of the student population – those with dyslexia and unexplained reading challenges.

Nearly four decades after our 1983 founding, HRS is still the only non-profit school in Washington State dedicated to educating this student population; therefore, we draw students from a sizable geographic area. A typical HRS academic year includes students (grades 1-8) from five Western WA counties and 60+ ZIP codes – including many current and alumni students from Snohomish County. A robust financial aid program provides up to 95% of individual student tuition to provide access to families across the socio-economic spectrum in a need-blind admission process. Financial aid can also apply toward after school programs and bus transportation.

Despite a recent expansion of the HRS campus to accommodate over 500 students each year, we recognize that the number of students who can directly enroll in our school has a limit. This is the core reason for the growth of outreach and service programs through the HRS Learning Center (e.g., the HRS Speaker Series).

Your grant is an endorsement of our mission. Thank you for helping us further our work and reach as many students and families as possible. We are honored to partner with Tulalip Tribes.
