We, the Board of Advisors for Huy (“Hoyt”), write with our deepest gratitude to you and your Tribe for your financial support of our work on behalf of incarcerated Indigenous relatives in Washington State.

The Tulalip Tribe granted Huy [REDACTED] on 04/04/2024. With your help in 2024 Huy supported Indigenous religious and cultural practices in all 12 of Washington’s State iron houses, directly touching 900+ Brothers and Sisters in 21 Indigenous Circles. Huy raised \$21,000.00 in 2023-2024 from tribal sources and distributed \$42,000.00 to the Circles with the additional help of non-tribal gifts.

Huy supports the religious and rehabilitative needs of incarcerated Indigenous people from the Pacific Northwest. Huy, pronounced “hoyt,” means “see you again/we never say goodbye” in the Coast Salish Lushootseed language, and that is the philosophy that drives our advocacies and partnerships. We engage in legal and political advocacy for Indigenous prisoners and support their religious, spiritual, and cultural activities in Washington state prisons.

Huy’s mission is to provide economic, educational, rehabilitative, and religious support for Indigenous people incarcerated in the Pacific Northwest and throughout the United States. Huy raises monies and receives financials gifts, to in turn be gifted, for the benefit of those incarcerated Indigenous people. For incarcerated Indigenous people, walking the red road while behind bars is the only road to rehabilitation and survival. Huy works to ensure that incarcerated Indigenous people are afforded traditional religious, spiritual, and cultural opportunities to rehabilitate themselves. We believe opportunities to pray, worship, and celebrate as Indigenous people are the best ways they can heal from their mistakes and prepare themselves to return home, where they belong, in the loving arms and hands of their families and communities. We believe those opportunities are also the best ways to reduce recidivism and prepare incarcerated Indigenous people for successful reentry into society.

We seek to empower incarcerated Indigenous people and their families and communities by first and foremost letting them know they are not forgotten, and then by fostering

traditional religious, spiritual, and cultural opportunities for rehabilitation and healing. Power lies within the hearts and minds of every incarcerated Indigenous person. But it must be tapped, and nurtured. Through the severe heat of sweat lodge, the relentless thump of the drum, the sacred smoke from the pipe, we seek to awaken the power of each incarcerated Indigenous person with whom we connect. We seek to allow each incarcerated Indigenous person to feel a sense of power, if not freedom, even from within the industrial prison complex. It is then up to the individual to harness his or her own power.

Please see the following note from our chairperson reporting on the activities at the Airway Heights Corrections Center Pow wow held on August 10, 2023. It illustrates your grant funds at work and how important your contributions are.

I write to share these poignant testimonials (including from a DOC official), and spectacular photos of the AHCC pow wow last week. As you look at the photos, please take a moment to ponder the vast blue sky, the lush green grass in the yard, the men's magnificent regalia, the intricacy of the handmade giveaway art, the freedom of it all. These powerful words and images capture why we do what we do. We look forward to creating the same history and memory on September 9, 2023 at Monroe. We raise our hands to each of you for your support of the Hoops, especially during pow wow season.

- Just wanted to touch base to let you know I attended AHCC Pow Wow today at the main institution. It was a wonderful event that was held outside in the sunshine. Well attended by the circle, families, and AHCC staff. In speaking with the population they expressed their gratitude for a well run event! I was honored to participate in the celebration and kudos to Supt. Haynes and his staff for another successful Pow Wow!
- Having attended at least five Pow Wow's held at AHCC, all of which were wonderful, life affirming events, I can say without a doubt that this recent Pow Wow was profoundly different. Ceremony: religious practice blended with cultural recognition and community were at the center of every action. Heartbreaking testimonials and a shared love of one another permeated the day. Being outside heightened the effect and the meal was delicious! DOC staff were present but kept their distance with respect. It was truly a privilege and an honor to both witness and participate.

- I was so fortunate to have attended, as a guest....Having never been inside a prison, having no experience at all with the justice system at this level, it was a huge experience for me, to say the least. My overwhelming takeaway was the men themselves — their gentleness, warmth among themselves, and joyful appreciation for all who came to celebrate with them. I was able to take a step back and glimpse all that leads to being incarcerated, and what it takes to cultivate personal strength and step out as a renewed individual. Knowing one’s cultural/spiritual traditions, practicing them in community, and relying on them to keep you going, was demonstrated to me that day as essential. It was a beautiful ceremony of orchestrated dances and honoring moments. I am so pleased to have met these men and their families.
