Background and description of the event:

The 2nd Annual Valerie Logan Luncheon took place on Wednesday, November 13 at noon in the Institute's auditorium and was a mission-focused fundraiser featuring a lunch served family style. Our emcee was Patti Payne of the Puget Sound Business Journal again this year. Here is an outline of the event program:

- Welcoming remarks
- Table-top science activity: full guest participation was requested. The activity was led by our Director of ISB's Logan Center for Education formerly known as the Center for Inquiry Science, Dr. Dana Riley Black.
- A Salute to Valerie Logan
- Dr. Lee Hood announced the rebrand and name change of the Center for Inquiry Science to the Logan Center for Education
- The Valerie Logan Leadership in Science Education award was presented to Meena Selvakumar, Director of the Portal to the Public at the Pacific Science Center. This award is given every year at this luncheon.
- There was a formal program entitled, "Spotlight on Partnership: Stories of Inspiration. It featured one of ISB's scientists and a teacher from the Tacoma Public School district who collaborated with that scientist.

- There was a student testimonial delivered by a student from the International School in Bellevue
- Finally, there was a solicitation delivered by the ISB's Board Chair, Mr. David Sabey.

Event revenue, expenses and statistics:

- Total contributed revenue including sponsorship: \$57,175
- Total sponsorship revenue: \$25,000
- Total contributed revenue from individuals: \$32,175
- Number of individual gifts: 75
- Total number of sponsors: 6

- Average gift per person NOT including sponsorship: \$429
- Average gift per person INCLUDING sponsorship: \$705
- Most prevalent gift (mode): \$200
- Total number of gifts of \$1000 or more which entitles those contributors to be members of the newly instituted giving society called The Friends of the Logan Center: 13
- Total expenses: \$9660
 - 17% of total event revenue

Also, as requested, here are some data on what contributions to the Logan Center for Education make possible:

- 1000 teachers per year are reached by our program.
- Approximately 10,000 students are reached by those teachers.
- Our programs are implemented in more than 20 school districts in Washington State each year.

As referenced in the application, our program reaches Tulalip tribal children who attend the following Marysville School district schools.

- The 10th Street Middle School
- The Arts and Technology High School

During the 2012 -13 school year, 3 teachers from these schools attended three days of professional development training provided by the Logan Center.

To provide some perspective on what a \$5000 contribution to the Center can make possible, here are some examples

- \$5000 will provide summer stipends for 20 teachers to participate in one, all-day Logan Center professional development workshop

- \$5000 will provide for 4 full days of professional development training for teachers via our program called “Observing Evidence of Learning”.

Important:

As the Tulalip Charitable Fund contribution arrived after the event had taken place, the Charitable Fund did not receive the benefits that our other sponsors received.

In deference to that fact, the Charitable Fund will be called out in our year-end email to the luncheon contributors and also on our website and in our monthly newsletter for the month of January.
