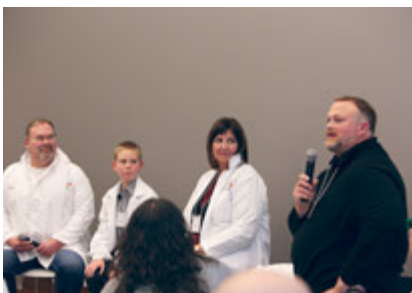

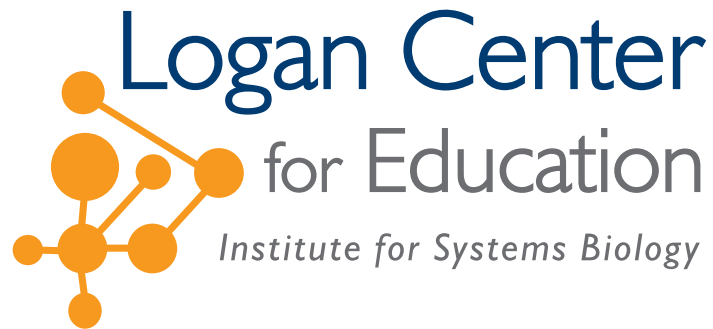

Background and description of the event:

The 3rd Annual Valerie Logan Luncheon took place on Wednesday, November 18, 2014 at noon in the Institute's auditorium and was a mission-focused fundraiser featuring a plated lunch. The theme of the event was, "Inspiring Teachers to inspire students: Next Generation Science". It attracted community, corporate, and volunteer partners; experts in the fields of life science and science education; contributors and friends. While there was no ticket price for the luncheon, there was a suggested donation of \$200 per person. All funds raised benefitted the Institute for Systems Biology's (ISB), Logan Center for Education.

Our emcee was Patti Payne of the Puget Sound Business Journal again this year. Here is an outline of the event program:

- Welcoming remarks
- Table-top science activity: full guest participation was requested. The activity was led by our Director of ISB's Logan Center for Education, Dr. Dana Riley Black.
- A Salute to Valerie Logan, Lee's wife and the founder of the Logan Center for Education
- The Valerie Logan Leadership in Science Education award was presented to Dr. Brian Fabien, Director of the Dynamic Systems Modeling and Controls Laboratory at the University of Washington. Following the luncheon he was appointed Associate Dean of Academic Affairs. He is a longtime participant in the Logan Center for Education's programming. This award is given every year at this luncheon.
- There was a formal program entitled, "Next Generation Science: A Panel Discussion". It featured Scott Beebe, former Hollywood Hill Principal, now Director of Technology for the Marysville School District, Kurt Archuleta and Jennie Knapp, 4th grade teachers at Hollywood Hill and Ben Dippy, 5th grade former student of Mr. Archuleta at

Hollywood Hill in the North Shore School District. The panel discussion was moderated by Dr. Terry Bergeson, Former WA State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

- Finally, Dr. Bergeson made a formal ask for support.

Event revenue, expenses and statistics:

- Total contributed revenue including sponsorship: \$81,570
- Total sponsorship revenue: \$43,000
- Total contributed revenue from individuals/non-sponsoring organizations: \$38,570
- Total # of individual gifts: 92 (includes gifts in lieu of attendance)
- Total # of sponsors: 10
- Total # of Attendees: 129
 - 85% participation (96 donors /113 expected contributors – excludes ISB staff and sponsor guests)
 - Average gift per person NOT including sponsorship: \$359.06
 - Average gift per person INCLUDING sponsorship: \$730.85
 - Most prevalent gift (mode): \$100.00
 - Total # of Gifts \$1000 or more: 16
- Total expenses: \$15,135.87
 - 18.6% of gross event revenue

Also, as requested, here are some data on what contributions to the Logan Center for Education make possible:

- 1000 teachers per year are reached by our program.
- Approximately 77,000 students are reached by those teachers.
- Our programs are implemented in more than 20 school districts in Washington State each year.

Of note: our programs are reaching Tulalip Tribe teachers and students at the Marysville School District's 10th Street Middle School and the Arts and Technology High School.

We have recently partnered with the Marysville School District, as well as UW College of Engineering, in submitting a Math and Science Partnership (MSP) grant to the State of Washington. We have been "conditionally" selected as an awardee for this funding. This grant will support Marysville teachers (5th grade + middle school + grades 9 and 10) in transitioning to the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), specifically to the engineering components of NGSS.


To provide some perspective on what a [REDACTED] contribution to the Center can make possible, here are some examples
