On behalf of the Medic One Foundation Board of Directors, I am pleased to share this brief report on the successful completion of our grant, **Q4 2020 14.2**, from Tulalip Tribes Charitable Contributions.

Thanks to your most generous support, [REDACTED], our Tulalip Bay Fire Department student, has graduated from our region's world-class Paramedic Training Program! James has returned to Tulalip Bay and is working in the field saving lives as a paramedic. Not only did James successfully graduate from Paramedic Training, but he was also awarded the prestigious Storbakken Award, which honors the graduating student with the highest achievement in patient airway management and intubation, a challenging medical procedure students must master in training. Attached are a few photos of James during training and at graduation. Additional information about the graduating class and our mission can be found at our website at www.mediconefoundation.org. Importantly, paramedics trained in our program serve over 3 million people in the Puget sound region annually.

As with last year, every effort was made to balance the risk of COVID-19 with the need to complete [REDACTED] education. Training was modified for Class #47 - social distancing required adjustments to classroom time, with many lectures done online for remote viewing. Even with these challenges, this class achieved remarkable outcomes. Over the year, Class #47 students:

- **Received 2,100 hours of instruction, nearly double the national recommendation.** The majority of lectures were taught by University of Washington faculty physicians. This quantity and quality of instruction, along with student determination, resulted in a **median course score of 90% for academics — truly exceptional!**
- **Acquired very extensive training in the field under the direct supervision of experienced paramedics. Students had a combined patient contact total of over 14,800 or an average of 640 per student—three times the national average.**
- **Performed more than 6,220 IVs and 610 intubations, two of the many difficult skills they successfully mastered.**
- **Participated in treatment for over 150 cardiac arrest victims combined.**

Thank you for making James' extensive training possible and helping to save more lives in your community. I am not sure if you have seen James since his completion of the Paramedic Training Program, but we would be thrilled to make arrangements for a meeting if you would like hear more about his year in paramedic training and his first few weeks in the field as a paramedic.
