#### In-School Outreach Program 2019/2020 Report

The program plan was to ensure that the In-School Outreach Program enhanced and complimented our current museum-based curriculum offerings, including pop culture genres such as music, game design, animation, dance, and more.

Previously, the current curriculum option was Fantastic Creatures, which focuses on utilizing what students learn about animal biology and habitats and using their imaginations to create new fantastic animals. For 2019/20, we incorporated a performance option, in addition to the in-classroom workshop, bringing curriculum to life through a live, interactive performance.

A major disturbance for In-School programming was the closure of in-person schooling from March until the end of the year. In order to meet this challenge, MoPOP began to put its in-school curriculum online for teachers to download and use in remote learning environments.

In the 2019/20 school year, we accomplished the following program expansion:

#### Increase efficiencies and create options.

- MoPOP was able to offer schools a menu of options, instead of building curriculum from scratch each time.
- MoPOP created a second curriculum option and finalized the performance-based workshop.

#### Increase number of students and schools served.

- With curriculum design more standardized, MoPOP educators were able to schedule additional schools in 2019-20.
- Programming was provided free of charge for select Title 1 and other schools, this year some of
  the schools receiving this program free of charge include: Bailey Gatzert, Mount Rainier High,
  and Hawthorne Elementary.

#### Plan for long term sustainability and impact.

Students received MoPOP admissions passes for their family to visit the museum, extending the
impact of arts-based programming. In 2019/20 - 469 individuals came to the museum using
these passes, extending their experience beyond the four walls of their classroom.

"I thought I wasn't going to like it but I really did!"


A major goal for this project was to use the experiences and activities of this program in order to inspire students to think of themselves as creative risk takers and innovators.

Evaluation of the program by teachers showed evidence of creativity and engagement being shown by those participating in the workshops:

"I thought the workshop went great. The instructors were very good at keeping the kid's attention and we loved the hands-on elements. After the workshop, my students were able to
