Please note: Additional anticipated funding did not occur to fully implement group series, however, outreach occurred at several local schools, Denny International Middle School, and Martin Luther King School, after several strategy meetings with Vice Principals, Marcus Pimpleton, it was determined that since the school has two groups for Black/East African male youth already in place for after school programs, that it was best to put our potential group on hold, and to explore other possibilities elsewhere.

We then did further outreach, and found a critical need for providing group and other support for traumatized younger Black/African American boys in Grades 3-5 at Martin Luther King Elementary School. Meetings occurred with Vice-Principal, Beatrice Butler, and a wraparound Project Design Model for proposed group was presented. The Project Design Model has been approved by Vice-Principal and has since been given to Seattle Public Schools District Supervisor for final approval. A curriculum based on the Project Design Model is ready to be prepared, and will focus on providing group lessons and activities for boys in grades 3-5, who have experienced complex trauma and toxic stress, and will help them to learn, heal, grow, and thrive, not only in their educational environment, but others as well, in relationships with teachers, peers, and family thru emotional regulation, and stress reduction; to share personal stories and celebrate culture and history. The wrap around layered approach will include teachers, and parents of traumatized kids, as well, in order to support their increased understanding and awareness of traumatic experiences that block students from learning, healing, growing and thriving.
