Q4 2024 14.2 Progress Report

This year marked a milestone for NW Children's Foundation: forty years of making hope work for children and families. And yet, even as we reflect on four decades of impact, our focus is firmly on the urgent and escalating challenges children and families are facing today.

At this uncertain time, we remain committed to being a steady, reliable partner. More than half of our grants are unrestricted and multi-year, because consistency matters when children and families are counting on services that cannot be interrupted. We are also doubling down on learning—convening, listening, and lifting up practices that support service providers and caregivers on the frontlines. Above all, we are ensuring that the resources entrusted to NWCF go where they are needed most.

With your support, we continue to sustain and support our region's capacity to build resilience and end the intergenerational cycle of child abuse, neglect, and trauma.

Grantmaking: With an ever-shifting policy and funding landscape NWCF's work – and the Tulalip Tribe's support – is more important than ever. In FY25 we distributed \$800,000 to 63 agencies doing essential work to heal children, strengthen families, and empower youth. These grants provide life-changing services to over 440,000 children annually in our community.

Educational Outreach: Our annual Forum on January 23 drew over 630 child-welfare stakeholders from 24 states and beyond to learn from experts in childhood trauma. This year's virtual event, Child Well-Being and the New Science of Resilience:

Practices to Heal Trauma and Nurture Hope, featured Dr. Linda Chamberlain and Abigail Bocanegra, LMFT. An expert for over two decades in the field of brain

development, Dr. Chamberlain shared the latest research and science-supported tools to balance the nervous system, highlight surprising facts about the hormone oxytocin, and discuss polyvagal insights for parenting – all with a focus on building collective resilience. Psychotherapist Abigail Bocanegra shared how she centers cultural wisdom and integrates the healing arts into her therapeutic work with children and families. Abigail's approach revitalizes Indigenous health and healing practices through the arts, offering a holistic method for reconnecting with ancestral and innate healing capacities.

The response to the event was outstanding: 90% of respondents said they could immediately apply what they learned, and attendees estimated that more than 100,000 families would benefit from the knowledge gained.

Thank you for your support over the last year and we look forward to continuing to collaborate and partner with your team in uplifting our community.
