Dear Marilyn,

On behalf of the Quality Child Care Division at Opportunity Council, we extend our deepest appreciation to the Tulalip Tribes for your support for the Emergency Child Care Voucher program. We are pleased to report back on our progress over the last year.

We especially would like to thank Tulalip Tribes for making it possible to expand the program from Whatcom County to also serve families in Snohomish, Skagit Counties, Island Counties, and San Juan Counties. Previously, we had to turn away families based on their address due to funding restrictions. Saying "No" was particularly difficult because we did not have another resource to refer families to—referral resources in their zip codes were simply non-existent. It has been a joy to say "Yes" when families in need request emergency child care support.

Who We Served

Since October 2019, the Emergency Child Care Voucher program has helped support employees-at pharmacies, hospitals, auto repair, food service, lumber, personal care, students, early childhood educators, and other workers who just needed a little extra help to keep their little ones enrolled in safe and high-quality child care while they work and keep a roof overhead.

Overall, 105 individuals were served and counting including:

- 24 single mothers
- 4 single fathers
- 2 parents fostering children
- 9 families headed by two-parents, and
- 57 children

Success, Challenges, and COVID-19

Like every other program and industry in Washington and around the world, COVID-19 impacted every aspect of our lives and changed the way that Opportunity Council works with children and families. Thanks to the support of the Tulalip Tribes, the Emergency Childcare Voucher Program was able to expand during the pandemic and has continued to serve families without disruption during extremely stressful times.

Our already existing plans to expand ensured a smooth transition to working remotely. By the time Washington State shut down for health and safety, we had an established system in place and were operating as planned in Snohomish, Skagit, Island, and Whatcom Counties. That would not have been possible without your support.

By March, the combination of school closures, massive unemployment, and parents working remotely drastically impacted the child care situation in our region. There already was a shortage of high-quality, licensed child care providers, and the pandemic has worsened the financial outlook for child care businesses. Programs were forced to close due to exposure or to protect themselves and family members.

At the same time, essential workers with school-age children had a sudden and urgent need to access safe, high-quality child care due to school closures. Many of these families were not income eligible for the state Working Connections child care subsidy. Often, families fell just outside the income guidelines—they still have low incomes but not low enough to qualify for public assistance. For many families with school-age children, this meant a new bill not accounted for in their tight family budgets. Thanks to the generosity of our donors, the Emergency Child Care Voucher program had the flexibility to serve families with low incomes who did not qualify for subsidized child care, primarily single mothers.

For example, one single mother in Skagit County had previously maintained a balanced budget with a low income, but the first month of school closure resulted in a child care bill for more than \$1,300 for her two children. As an essential worker, she did not work from home and could not afford the massive unplanned bill that would be a hardship for any working family. Thanks to Tulalip Tribes, we were able to provide enough assistance to ensure that the family remained safe and stable, and the following month the children enrolled in an affordable non-profit program hosted by their school district. This is just one example of many.

Other highlighted successes include:

- 1) Implement a streamlined application process: Success! An online application and approval process was implemented with positive feedback from our child care partners.
- 2) Increase Program Capacity: In the last year, the Emergency Child Care Voucher program increased the number of families serve by roughly 30%. This fell short of our original ambitious goals, largely impacted by COVID-19, but we still celebrate it as a success.
- 3) Increase Financial Stability for Families: 83% of families maintained stable after one month of assistance, and seven families received up to three months of assistance.
- 4) Strengthened Relationships with Child Care Providers: In the last year, we developed and strengthened relationships with child care programs in Lynnwood, Edmonds, Mill Creek, Everett, Concrete, Lake Stevens, Oak Harbor, Mt. Vernon, Blaine, Bellingham, and Ferndale.
