PROJECT GOALS SUMMARY

The program was designed to foster both artistic growth and social-emotional development in youth and teens. Through inquiry-based learning and collaborative projects, students were encouraged to take creative risks, solve problems, and express themselves in positive, healthy ways.

Key goals included developing new artistic skills and vocabulary, building resilience and perseverance, experiencing success through goal-oriented planning, and strengthening communication and teamwork. The program aimed to empower students to grow in confidence, explore challenging media, and build meaningful relationships with peers and mentors.

KEY PROJECT ACTIVITIES

Pratt's Primary summer programs—Youth Free/Pay-What-You-Can Classes, Youth Summer Art Camp, Teen Summer Art Week, and Family & Me Workshops—offered youth, teens, and families the opportunity to explore a wide range of visual art forms in a safe and supportive environment.

Through active, inquiry-based learning and cooperative engagement, Pratt teaching artists delivered hands-on instruction across diverse media.



Youth students (ages 6–12) engaged with art fundamentals such as drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture, and collage.

Teen students (ages 13–18) explored advanced topics including glassblowing, frameworking, jewelry, printmaking, woodworking, textiles (fiber arts, fashion design, leather bag making), welding and blacksmithing, drawing (figure drawing, urban sketching), painting (portrait painting, watercolor techniques), armor making, graphic novel design, taxidermy, and art as activism.

Families participated in 4-hour collaborative workshops focused on welding, frameworking, glassblowing, and glass fusing.

PROJECT IMPACT

From June 1- August 31, 2024, Pratt provided 65 classes and workshops (297 total sessions) of hands-on arts learning to 416 students. Twenty-two teaching artists provided 1,282 hours of high-quality instruction and engagement.

Project impact by program type follows:

Youth Free/Pay-What-You-Can Classes: 25 students; 4 classes (17 sessions); 23.5 hours of instruction

Youth Summer Art Camp: 105 Students; 17 classes (85 sessions); 595 hours of instruction

Teen Summer Art Week: 264 students; 38 classes (189 sessions); 639.5 hours of instruction

Family & Me Workshops: 22 students; 6 workshops (6 sessions); 24 hours of instruction

Tuition Assistance: \$9,602 awarded for Summer Youth & Teen programming
