2024. We are pleased to provide this report, and have attached our 2023-24 impact report that includes an acknowledgement of the Tribes' contribution on page 5.

Your grant supported us as we continued to provide 24/7 advocacy, including in-person response, to victims of sexual violence of all ages and in a variety of settings; evidence-based therapy for survivors and their loved ones; specialized support for individuals who have experienced, are experiencing, or are at risk of trafficking or exploitation; and prevention education to youth, community organizations, businesses, parents, and others.

During our 2023-24 fiscal year, Rebuilding Hope provided 2,915 hours of advocacy in 5,071 advocacy sessions to 1,725 youth and adult survivors. These sessions included 1,232 hours of in-person support through 790 service sessions, including 381 real-time responses to local emergency departments across Pierce and Kitsap counties, as well as 1,193 helpline phone calls, and 377 text, 622 email, and 64 online chat contacts. The individuals we assisted included 171 survivors who received legal advocacy and 258 parents of child abuse victims whom we helped better support their child. We also assisted 79 incarcerated people statewide via our specialized helpline. In addition, we provided 1,810 hours of therapy to 128 survivors and their loved ones, and provided 1,092 service sessions to 67 youth and adults experiencing, or at risk of, sexual trafficking. We also gave prevention education presentations to 2,768 local participants.

In 2023-24, 52% of clients who disclosed their race identified as people of color while 48% identified as white. 77% were served in Pierce County, 16% in Kitsap County, and 7% in south King County. 84% were female, 13% male, and 3% non-binary.

We are excited to let the Tribes know that we have purchased a building, and in January 2025, we will open our offices in our first-ever owned space at 723 Martin Luther King Jr. Way in Tacoma's Hilltop neighborhood. The new property is more centrally located than our current office in the Dome District and has almost twice the square footage. We are in the process of renovating the building into a healing center for survivors of sexual violence. We anticipate that the facility's intentional design as a space for survivors will improve each client's day-to-day experience of receiving services, resulting in more positive outcomes. The flexibility and size of the new space will also allow us to provide a wider range of services to meet the unique needs of each survivor, easily adapt to changes in our work, and continue to grow in order to meet the increasing demand for our programs.

Because our new home is 72 years old and includes factory spaces unsuitable for our work, it requires significant improvements before it can become the healing center we envision. The work most essential to allow us to move in will be completed by the end of the month, while the next phase of construction to enhance the building and create dedicated spaces for certain programming (including a drop-in center for victims of sexual exploitation and trafficking) will begin in 2025. The support of funders like the Tulalip Tribes continues to be crucial as we navigate this capital project.
