Organization's General Goals:

It began with a small group of commercial fishermen in Alaska who took unintentionally caught fish (known as bycatch) that were required by law to be thrown back into the sea, and gave those fish – vital, healthy protein – to food banks. Over the past 28 years, SeaShare has grown its donations far beyond our original bycatch program. Now 90 percent of our seafood is first-run, marketable product, donated by generous fishermen and processors around the country. They believe in the power of seafood to help those served by food banks and feeding centers. Over 250 million seafood servings have been distributed so far and we're still counting.

Dear Ms. Sheldon,

SeaShare is so thankful for your generous support in 2021. You helped us bring more seafood to more hungry people in Washington. The \$[REDACTED] contribution we received from the Tulalip Tribes provided 16,000 servings of seafood. We estimate that this fed 5,333 individuals.

Because of the generosity of the Tulalip Tribes Charitable Contributions and others, SeaShare was able to donate a total of 229,656 pounds of seafood in Washington in 2021, which is the equivalent of 918,624 servings of seafood to those in our community who need it most.

Our donations in Washington went to Food Lifeline's 275-member food banks, food pantries, and feeding centers in Western Washington; to Skagit Gleaners; and the Union Gospel Mission's meal program in Seattle. Seafood donations included canned wild Alaskan salmon, frozen wild Alaskan salmon steaks, frozen wild Alaskan halibut steaks, and frozen Alaskan pollock portions.

We continued to work closely with the community of fishermen in Alaska and Washington to provide the highest quality first-run seafood products to the food banks we serve. We are happy to report that in 2021 we were able to improve access to nutritious seafood for our neighbors struggling with food insecurity, so that they can better learn, work, and contribute to the community.

Thank you for all that you do to support nonprofits in our region. Sorry we don't have any pictures from last year; COVID-19 prevented us from getting "out in the field" to be able to document our work.
