We want to thank you again for the March 2016 gift from the Tulalip Tribes Charitable Fund to support of Seattle Education Access's post-secondary education access programs for at-risk young people (Q4 2015 14.2).

With support from Tulalip Tribes Charitable Fund, in 2016 Seattle Education Access (SEA) provided opportunity through higher education access and retention to 822 young people struggling to overcome poverty and adversity in King County. We help low-income and marginalized young people succeed at completing degrees at local community colleges, technical colleges, and four-year institutions of higher education.

SEA specializes in serving young people whose educations have been interrupted by poverty, trauma, and profound adversity. We prioritize students who have experienced homelessness, single parents, immigrants, and those who did not successfully complete high school. Of the over 1,500 students served from 2011-2016:

- 100% were low-income
- 53% have experienced homelessness
- 10% have been in foster care
- 22% are single parents
- 77% are people of color
- 32% are immigrants
- 76% are first in their family to attend college
- 47% are first in their family to earn a high school credential
- 15% identify as LGBTQ
- 42% male, 55% female, and 3% transgender or gender non-conforming

SEA's Education Advocates help young people earn college degrees by offering academic advising, career counseling, professional mentoring, subject tutoring, books and school supplies, technology access, and scholarships. Our holistic approach addresses all the barriers that stand between an individual student and academic success. Education Advocates form individual relationships with each student, becoming a mentor and an advocate in the higher academic arena.

Accomplishments

At SEA, we are extremely proud of our students' achievements, despite incredible barriers. In 2016, we expected to serve over 800 students between our programs. With support from The Tulalip Tribes, in 2016 Seattle Education Access (SEA) provided opportunity through higher education access and retention to 822 young people struggling to overcome poverty and adversity in King County.

- 77 students in our College Prep Program earned a high school diploma (50) or GED (27)
- 107 students in our College Prep Program completed a college assessment test, such as the COMPASS, ACT or SAT
- 83 students started a higher education program
- 62 students in our College Success Program earned a higher education degree; 24 professional/technical degrees, 19 AA or AS degrees, and 19 BA or BS degrees.

In 2016, SEA created a second Program Director position to oversee the training and management of our growing team of Education Advocates; Program Manager Danika Martinez was promoted to fill the position. Our other Program Director, Jeff Corey oversees programs and partnership development. Both Program Directors are not taking new students, but do have a caseload of current students that they serve, on average, for 20 hours a week. In the past 18 months, SEA's team has grown from 6.25 to 14 FTE staff members, of which 12 FTE are program staff. We are also now supported by 9 full-time AmeriCorps volunteers in the 2016-2017 school year. We do expect the pace of growth to slow in 2017, but plan to budget for at least one more additional staff member.
