Dear Marilyn:

On behalf of all of us at Seattle Rep, thank you for the Tulalip Tribe's support for the Public Works program. Since 2016, this program has propelled Seattle Rep's vision of a world with theater at the heart of public life through community-engaged theatermaking. As a long-running and key Public Works supporter, we wanted to take this opportunity to share with you additional details about the impact of your support.

In 2024, the Public Works team held 40 free theater classes at three partner locations during our winter and spring quarters, along with seven one-day workshop held at four of our partner locations and at Seattle Rep. We also held two open mic nights at our theater for the Public Works community in response to their desire to showcase their skills outside of classes. In total, 149 people attended classes, workshops, and open mic nights at Byrd Barr Place, Ballard Northwest Senior Center, Path With Art, Renton Veterans' Center, Seattle Central College, and onsite at Seattle Rep.

At Ballard NW Senior Center, Teaching Artists Danny Kam and Taylor Symons co-taught Musical Theater Performance to seniors in two eight-week sessions in winter and spring quarters. In this popular class, participants learned songs from musicals like "Zero to Hero" from Disney's Hercules and "Any Way the Wind Blows" from Hadestown, complete with simple choreography that was easily adaptable to all levels of mobility. At Renton Veterans' Center, VJ Orduña taught Storytelling to veterans in both winter and spring, working with participants to shape their personal stories into compelling monologues. And in winter quarter, Neen Williams-Teramachi taught Intro to Drama at North Seattle Boys and Girls Club to budding thespians.

Parker's signature Improv for Wellness workshop held at Seattle Rep; a scene study mega session with Pilar O'Connell, VJ Orduña, and Amelio Garcia at Seattle Rep; and Production 101 lead by Ollie Ward, where participants could learn more about the behind-the-scenes process of making theater at Seattle Rep.

Free Public Works theater classes prepare participants to audition for, rehearse, and perform in a pageant-style production on stage at Seattle Rep. This year, we evolved our approach to community-engaged theatermaking by experimenting with a new model for our Public Works program. Rather than a standalone pageant-style production, this season we incorporated Community Ensembles into our mainstage production of The Skin of Our Teeth, with the plan of creating a unique and repeatable community-engaged theater model that can be employed in one show every season. During the course of The Skin of Our Teeth, 267 community members graced the Bagley Wright stage alongside a professional cast of 14. By engaging our community in a full-run production, this model allowed us to exceed the total number of community members involved in any past Public Works pageant production. In total, 37 performers from our Public Works community made up the rotating Community Ensemble who rehearsed and performed approximately three times per week; 111 special guests played the "Hours of the Night" and read passages from Plato, Aristotle, Spinoza, and the Bible; and an additional 119 community members joined the full-company scenes in each act. We also invited local performance ensembles and artists to perform in our lobby during intermission, hosting a total of 12 intermission performances by community groups including buskers from local Pike Place Market, various barbershop groups, and the Men's Whistling Chorus.

Between classes, workshops, open mic nights, and *The Skin of Our Teeth*, 416 people in total participated in the Public Works program in 2024. The number of overall participants in *The Skin of Our Teeth* alone is five times as large as the number of participants in our 2023/24 Public Works production of *The Tempest*, and it was seen by nearly four times as many patrons. A total of 10,518 patrons attended *The Skin of Our Teeth*. Combined, a total of 10,934 people were impacted by Public Works in 2024. We are proud of the impact this program has made, and we are already looking forward to how we might replicate this new model for the program next year.
