

Total Number of Individuals Impacted: > 400,000 (Sightline's work aims to benefit all communities in the Pacific Northwest. The exact number of people is difficult to calculate, as we are not a direct service organization. Sightline currently reaches over 408,000 individuals through our website alone, and over 48,000 follow our emails and work through social media. Our project work on coal exports and crude oil-by-rail is also used by the Power Past Coal and Stand Up to Oil campaigns and other allies to reach their own audiences. Sightline also serves to support a large network of organizations and individuals working on the long-term health of our region, helping to maximize our combined impact.)

Project Report:

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Sightline's research has continued to unleash a maelstrom of citizen opposition to dirty energy projects, even as we uncover new natural gas and petrochemical processing schemes. Working in ongoing partnership with campaigns like Power Past Coal and Stand Up to Oil, as well as shoulder-to-shoulder with a network of advocacy groups including Climate Solutions, ForestEthics, the Lummi Nation, the Quinault Indian Nation, and others, we have been able to leverage our work and deepen our impact.
