This report outlines the projects, trainings and emergency responses that these funds supported. Between 2016 and through 2019, the Snohomish MRC has conducted over 100 classroom trainings including MRC Orientations, shelter training, first aid/CPR, Cultural Competence, Risk Communication, Psychological First Aid, Activation Training, Points of Dispensing and more.

All of these trainings prepared volunteers to participate in training exercise. Some of the exercises were formal functional and full-scale exercise:

Other exercises were also volunteer opportunities to give back to community, including staffing over 30 first aid stations. MRC Volunteers provided health screenings at health fairs to over 800 individuals. MRC Volunteers also participated in the Amen! Free Clinic and staffed the lost person station at the Evergreen State Fair.

Through a partnership with the Everett Housing Authority, MRC Volunteers provide health and safety assessments to residents in the public housing community on a weekly basis – the Community Health Risk Reduction Project (CHRRP).



MRC Volunteers at Bakerview for Community Health Risk Reduction Program MRC Volunteers staffed cold weather shelters in Snohomish and Monroe serving nearly 200 unduplicated guests in a season.

The trainings also prepared volunteers to respond to public health emergencies here in Snohomish County as well as with partners in Washington State.

In conclusion, the MRC program has directly impacted people through trainings (200), medical services (1000), cold weather shelters (200 per season) and projects like the lost person station (over 100) and CHRRP (100). However, the cumulative work that the MRC Volunteers have done has helped all of Snohomish County be more resilient and prepared for a disaster.

The funds from Tulalip Tribes allowed the MRC to offer refreshments to volunteers at 15 of the trainings listed below, making it more convenient for volunteers to attend. A total of 193 volunteers attended these trainings.
