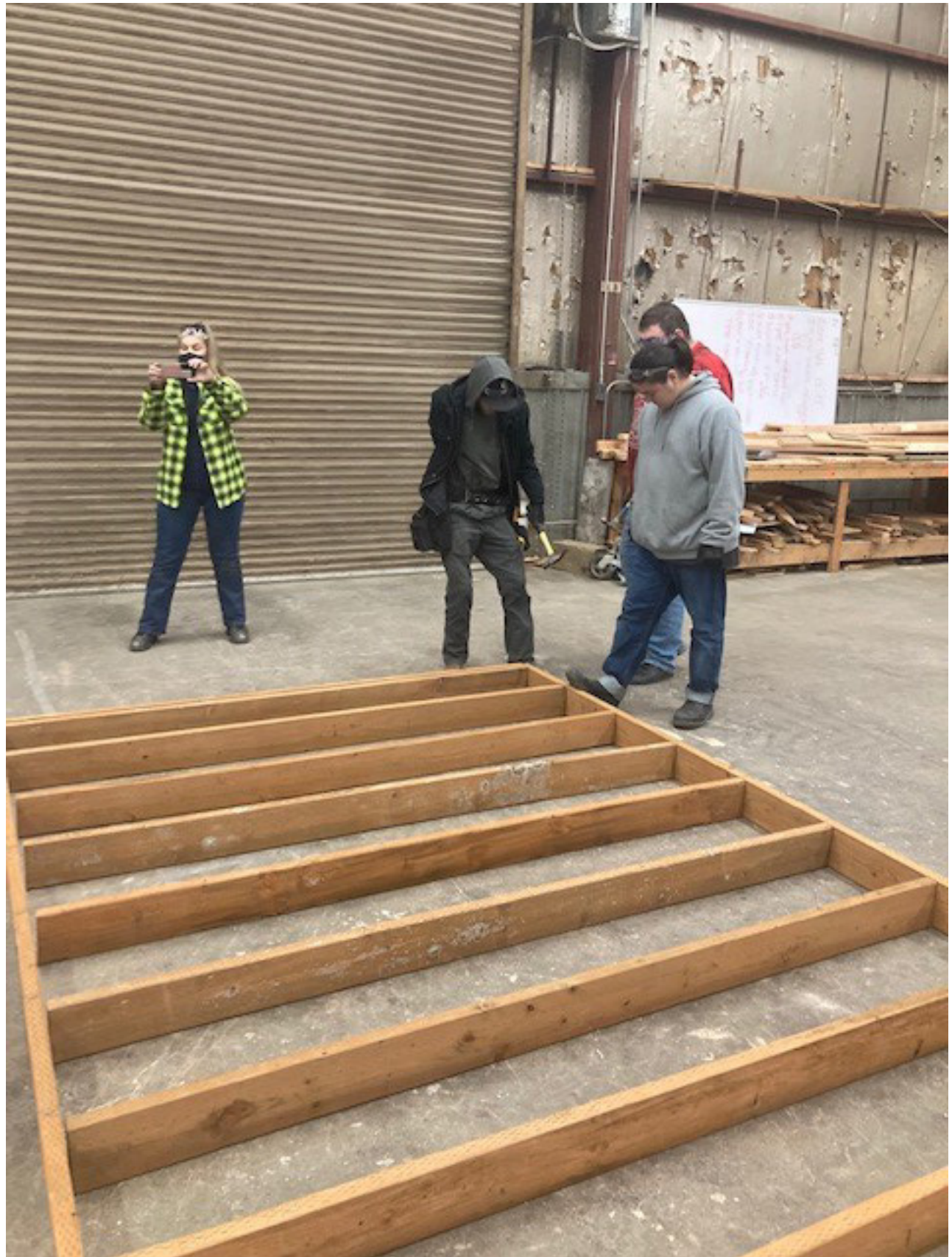

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## Summer/Fall 2021 class report

COVID 19 has affected the TVTC Summer/Fall 2021 class. The class started in August, Students were not permitted to drive twelve in a van so visiting apprenticeship training sites and job sites was not possible for this group.

TVTC has a new instructor, Lisa Marx. Lisa is a journey level scaffold erector and previous recruiter for the Carpenters training center. Lisa is passionate about equity in the trades and very giving with her knowledge. TVTC is very excited to have her join the team.

In preparation of COVID, the shop was grid out in six-foot blocks so students could learn in a social distance manor and provide a save environment for fifteen students. Two students were exposed and came down with COVID. Based on The Tulalip Tribes policy they needed to home isolated for fourteen days and missed too much to complete the training. They will start the 2022 training class.

The quality of the training remained status quo and the students were able to do the following

Describe how the construction industry is organized, how a typical residential building project is organized and what kinds of jobs and skills are required for careers in the construction industry so that they can create an effective plan or pathway to get a job in the industry.

- Read and understand basic blue prints, use an architect's scale, draw simple scaled orthographic drawings.
- Correctly layout and set up batter boards for excavation and foundation forms, setting lines, for a house, that are accurate within  $\frac{1}{2}$  inch.
- Improved trades math skills with decimals, fractions, Pythagorean theorem and Ohm's law
- Learned components and safety of electrical. Built a three-way circuit with Krystal McCann in the lead
- Identify, name, size and describe how basic construction materials and fasteners are used.
- Layout using a laser level to shoot grades
- Draw orthographic shop drawings and build a small wood personal project
- Build footing and wall forms
- Build personal projects
- Recognize typical components of framing
- Lay out and frame basic wood floor platform
- Lay out and frame a typical wall, window and door openings
- Lay out a roof rafter and cut a typical stair jack
- Recognize fall safety issues and complete a fall protection plan
- Attend work place 101
- Complete an employment history record and create a resume
- Participate in a mock interview preparation
