Dear Ms. Sheldon,

We are deeply appreciative of the generous contribution provided by Tulalip Tribes to the DECA program in Snohomish County. Your contribution helped us offer extensive career education and leadership development programming to local students. A portion of your grant also supported scholarships that helped Snohomish County students participate in the full DECA experience.

In the 2020-2021 school year, 938 students were part of DECA in Snohomish County at a total of 17 schools in 9 districts, plus 1 private school. Many local schools had purely online classes for a portion of the year, and Washington

DECA transitioned all programming to accommodate virtual learning, including classroom curriculum and virtual conferences. Many chapters were still able to operate their students store as ecommerce. Washington DECA launched Digital Challenges and industry-based roundtable sessions with Executive Mentors who were either a DECA alumni or professional member. These resources were made available through weekly advisor emails, social media, and on dedicated websites (Teach DECA and Learn DECA).

In the 2021-22 school year, 1,007 students participated in Snohomish County DECA at 18 schools in 9 districts, plus 1 private school. Programming returned to being fully in-person, and students participated in conferences, business classes, after-school programming, competitions, and more.

We began tracking detailed scholarship data in the 2021-22 school year. During that time, we provided \$1,840 in scholarships to Snohomish County students. This support helped ensure access to participants for whom cost is a barrier.





In addition, we have attached our 2020-21 impact report, which includes an acknowledgement of Tulalip Tribes' support on page 7.

On behalf of Washington DECA, thank you for supporting our members during this difficult year. As we look back, we are both humbled by the support and the experience, but excited by the opportunities ahead.

With your help, Washington DECA was able to achieve success in the following:

- Provided members with 100% of normal programming in a virtual format including conferences, trainings, community service projects and fundraising events.
- · Scaled budgets and controlled expenses to achieve net profit.
- Provided support to teachers for lesson plans and intra-curricular activities.
- · Applied for and received funds from round #2 of the Payroll Protection Loan program.

Along with accomplishments came many challenges:

- DECA membership was down 27% and 90% of the members lost, were in low-income schools.
- Engagement in virtual events was approximately 75% compared to in-person events.
- Fundraising was difficult as companies continued to move support from education to human services.

As we look forward to 2021-2022, we continue to make strategic decisions based on our mission, vision, and strategic plan, while placing emphasis on providing equity and inclusion at all levels of Washington DECA.





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WESTERN REGION LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE (WRLC)

Our virtual WRLC provided learning opportunities for a diverse group of students from DECA's Western Region. This program featured 1,379 members who participated in industry workshops, an innovation pitch competition, live mock role-plays, five keynote sessions, gratitude and character development activities, and leadership academies. 159 business partners provided support in the form of judges and workshop presenters.





STATE CAREER DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE (SCDC)

Competitive events provide students with an experiential learning opportunity in business and marketing applications. Students qualify by advancing from regional competitions in 11 geographical locations across Washington state. SCDC has become the premier event for Washington DECA.

In addition, 361 volunteers from the business community donated their time and talent to serve as virtual judges. Top students from each of the 50 events qualified for the International Career Development Conference (ICDC).

INTERNATIONAL CAREER DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE (ICDC)

777 students and advisors attended the virtual ICDC. In addition to competition, students and advisors participated in leadership training and professional development opportunities.

At ICDC, Washington DECA emerged as one of the top associations, earning the following awards. 93 Washington DECA participants advanced from the preliminaries to the final competition. During the Grand Awards Session, 50 of our students were honored, each as one of the top 10 competitors in their event. As the awards ceremony closed, 24 of our students had placed in the top three levels, earning 11 third-place awards, 8 second-place awards, and 5 first-place awards!
