We are deeply appreciative of the generous contribution provided by

Tulalip Tribes to the DECA program in Snohomish County. Your contribution helped us offer extensive career education and leadership development programming to local students. A portion of your grant also supported scholarships that helped Snohomish County students participate in the full DECA experience.

In the 2022-23 school year, DECA continued to bounce back from the pandemic, growing in membership across the state and holding all of our usual programming in-person. In Snohomish County, 1,135 students participated in DECA—a 21% increase in membership over the previous school year.

A portion of your grant also supported financial aid to students in need, helping cover their conference attendance costs. In the 2022-23 school year, we provided \$4,355 in scholarships to Snohomish County students. This support helped ensure access to participants for whom cost is a barrier. This assistance had a significant impact in ensuring that students facing financial barriers could participate in DECA, as seen by the following quote by a Snohomish County scholarship recipient:

"My mom works two jobs 5 out of 7 days in the week and it's mostly just to make rent. We get food from the food bank every Thursday. All this is to say, we don't really have a lot of cash to spend on extracurricular, even if it would help me on my pathway into the future."

#### FALL LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE (FLC)

The Fall Leadership Conference provides hands-on learning opportunities for a diverse group of students across Washington state. This program featured 1,650 members who participated in industry workshops, a business pitch competition, mock role-plays and job interviews, keynote sessions and an advanced student leadership academy. 201 business partners provided support in the form of judges and workshop presenters.





## STATE CAREER DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE (SCDC)

Competitive events provide students with an experiential learning opportunity in business and marketing applications. Students qualify by advancing from regional competitions in 11 geographical locations across Washington state. SCDC has become the premier event for Washington DECA and largest event in Bellevue, WA outside of sports.


In addition, 316 volunteers from the business community donated their time and talent to serve as judges. Top students from each of the 50 events qualified for the International Career Development Conference (ICDC). This year, we had a record number of state conference attendees at 4,311.

## INTERNATIONAL CAREER DEVELOPMENT CONFERENCE (ICDC)

The Washington DECA delegation attending the international DECA conference reached a recording-breaking 1,040 students and advisors. In addition to competition, students and advisors participated in leadership training academies and professional development opportunities over the 5-day conference in Orlando, FL.

Washington DECA members earned the following awards: 211 Washington participants advanced from the preliminaries to the final competition. During the Grand Awards Session, 71 competitors were honored, each as one of the top 10 competitors in their event. As the awards ceremony closed, 34 of our students had placed in the top three, earning 7 third-place awards, 3 second-place awards, and 12 first-place awards!

Overall, every 1 in 4 Washington competitors were a finalist (Top 20 team) and of those 52 Top 20 teams, 41 teams placed Top 10 in their event!

#### INTRODUCING NoSHUNTAE'S GIFT

Our organization serves 11 geographical Areas across our state. **Competition Bootcamps** provide the opportunity for students facing financial challenges to receive competition guidance through additional support by participating in mock competitions, testing and workshops. These events embodied our commitment to serving every member this year, regardless of location or opportunity.
